DEVYN SPENCE BENSON is Assistant Professor of History and Africana Studies at Williams College. Benson received her PhD from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in Latin American history, where her research focused on racial discourses during the first three years of the Cuban Revolution. She is the author of published and forthcoming articles and reviews in the Journal of Transnational American Studies and PALARA: Publication of the Afro-Latin / American Research Association. Benson is currently working on her manuscript "Not Blacks, but Citizens: Race and Revolution in Cuba, 1959–1978." The book examines the links between race and revolution in Cuba after 1959 and the effects those connections had on Afro-Cuban lives. Using the voices of Afro-Cubans living and compromising with the revolution, Benson's research seeks to reconcile stories of post-1959 black censorship with narratives of revolutionary opportunity. This project has also led her to explore connections between Cubans of African descent and African Americans.

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PAUL LOKKEN is Associate Professor of History at Bryant University. His research on various aspects of the experience of Africans and their descendants in colonial Central America has been published in *The Americas*, *Slavery and Abolition*, and several other journals, as well as in edited collections published by the Facultad Latinoamericana de Ciencias Sociales (FLACSO, El Salvador) and Duke University Press, the latter of which was translated into Spanish by the Editorial Universidad Estatal a Distancia of San José, Costa Rica, in 2012.
