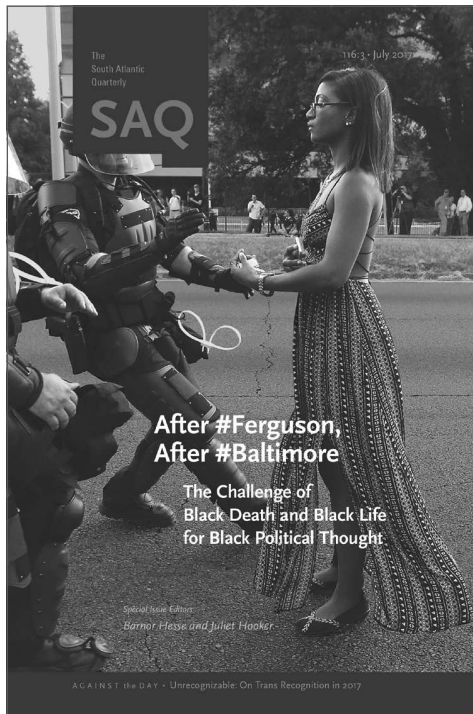


**After #Ferguson,
